INTRODUCTION

Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust was established in the year 1992 and registered under the Indian Trust Act in Coimbatore. Initially, the organization was focusing on the elimination of child labour practices in the district but eventually involved in the empowerment of women and comprehensive development of the textile and garment industry workers. Since then VIZHUTHUGAL has been operating as a relentless campaigner for the protection and promotion of the rights of these sectors and with the goals of empowering the poor and the Dalits and emancipating them from slavery.

Vizhuthugal for the past 25 years closely works with the government, CSO partners, donor organizations as well as with the affected community to bring system change that encourages the educational, social and economic development of vulnerable communities and contributes to the empowerment of women and children.

Vizhuthugal provided training to panchayat representatives about sanitary workers' health, their children's educational development, sanitation development in rural and urban areas, etc. All ward members and panchayat presidents have benefited from this training.

Vizhuthugal coordinators and organizers visited the slum areas and colonies of poor people and conducted special camps for them to get family cards, housing patta, Aadhaar cards, health cards, OAP etc. This enabled more than 1,000 people to get vital cards and Government schemes.

CHILDREN RESOURCE CENTRES

The very first Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust intervention was a humble after-school evening class for children in the year 2003. Erode and Tiruppur, where we started, is the textile hub for South India and children in the family were naturally engaged in the trade. Organizations have reduced the dropout rate in these districts by various Enrollment campaigns. Children Resource Centres and other activities from 2003 and focused on enrolling the children in the schools by eradicating child labourers. These activities were carried out in partnership with the State government. Under this program, we have mainstreamed 571 children in government schools. Our child labour elimination programme was started as a solution to educate these children who were being engaged as a child and bonded labour. An hour or two of evening classes with us served as their only school, giving them dreams of becoming a doctor or an engineer. It was this ambition we saw in the children, that led us to develop our intervention into a full-fledged programme. We are proud that these children not only finished school but reached greater heights.



The mission of the Children's Resource Center is to provide early intervention programs that focus on the development and educational needs of children from birth through age five and to offer support to the child's family. CRC's mission is to provide child-centred, family-focused mental health and co-occurring mental health and substance abuse services to all in the villages of Nambiyur Block and Avinashi Block of Tiruppur District.

To create a healthy, supportive environment for growth, development and healing, we believe family, medical providers, school, community, and friends are all essential and must work together. Therefore, we strive to provide collaborative, compassionate, affordable methods designed to maximize the child's safety and future happiness. Vizhuthugal has identified the children in the working villages and train, enroll them in regular schools despite their economic conditions by forming Children Resource Centres.



EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT



Vizhuthugal organized an Education Support program for children of sanitary workers and manual scavengers in the Vizhuthugal office. The meeting was presided over by M. Thangavel, Director- Vizhuthugal and he spoke about the importance of education to the children and also provided guidance to 10th and 12th standard students about their higher studies and opportunities available for them. Education support was given to 67 children in the target villages of which 32 boys and 45 girls were benefited through the support in all the 20 villages in Nambiyur Taluk, Erode District and 10 wards of Tiruppur Districts. After receiving the amount, the Children and their parents thanked the organization for the support.



SUPPORT TO GARMENT INDUSTRY LABOUR DAUGHTER

Vikashini, 12 years old from Tirumuruganpoondi, Tiruppur is one among the beneficiaries who received Educational Support from the Organization. His father Mr Murugesh works as a daily wage labourer in the Garments industry and her mother passed away four years ago. Vikashini and his brother are taken care of by their disabled grandfather and grandmother who works as a sanitary worker. They struggle a lot to fulfil their basic needs with the very little earnings of her father and grandparents. Her situation was identified by the Vizhuthugal organisation and helped her with the scholarships to continue her studies.



UNIVERSAL CHILDREN'S DAY



The United Nations' (UN) Universal Children's Day, which was established in 1954, is celebrated on November 20 each year to promote international togetherness and awareness among children worldwide. Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust promotes and coordinates this special day, which also works towards improving children's welfare.

Vizhuthugal organized a rally with the Children in the target villages by raising slogans like "**Stop Child Abuse**", "**Today's Children are tomorrow's Leader**", "**Enough is Enough, Stop Child Labour**". Universal Children's Day is not just a day to celebrate children for who they are but to bring awareness to children around the globe that have experienced violence in the forms of abuse, exploitation, and discrimination.

WORLD DAY AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS

World Day against Human Trafficking in persons was organised in New Tiruppur and Ammapalayam Ambedkar Nagar, Tirupur District. The event was attended by people from the area. Human trafficking is the abduction of women, children and men into forced labour in sexual activities. Worldwide, 21 million people are enslaved in forced labour. Human trafficking is an international crime. Victims and Migrant workers are abducted without knowing they are trafficked work.



Women and children, the poor, those who do not know the language, those who do not have parental love, those who have left home, those who are physically and mentally ill are subjected to abduction. The body parts of the abducted children are stolen and made to beg in the streets. Women and girls are subjected to sexual abuse and forced into illegal work. Ms Sudha, a field worker, made the people of the area aware of the dangers of forcing them to work long hours for low wages, forcing them to marry and adopt children illegally. They created awareness among the people using the slogans such as "we will eradicate human trafficking, we will put an end to human trafficking, we will speak out against human trafficking, our goal is to prevent human trafficking"



EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT TO SABARISWARI FROM MINNAKATTUPALAYAM

Sabariswari aged 19 years from Minnakattupalayam village, Anjanor Panchayat, studying B.Sc. Nursing 2nd year in KG Nursing college, Coimbatore. Sabariswari lives with her father Murugan and Mother Chitra in the village. Her father works as a daily wage worker and her mother works under MGNREGA 100 days' work and due to the Covid-19 lockdown both of her parents stayed in the home without having any work and they found it difficult to take care of their family needs. Sabariswari stayed in the college hostel and continued her education and due to the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, the college was closed. Her Mother is a member of the community support group in her village and Sabariswari is a member of the Adolescent support group in the village. During her school days, she participates in all the programs and important days celebrations actively. During the month of May, Vizhuthugal has supported her family with emergency relief materials worth Rs. 1000 and they expressed that it is very much helpful for them to manage their daily needs.

After a few months of this difficulty, Sabariswari faced another problem in which her family struggled a lot. The college has asked the students to pay the fees for the semester and her parents have no idea about arranging the money for her daughter's education. Parents find it difficult to take care of her college fees and the college insisted them to pay the fees for the semester but they find it difficult to arrange money since both the parents were jobless for many months and now they are involved in daily wage work and they couldn't bear the total cost. Her mother requested help from the community support group member in the meeting and explained the situation to the members and the field coordinator Mrs. Dhanalakshmi and Mrs. Rukamani. After passing the resolution in the group meeting, it is decided to help her with the education support. The timely help received from the Vizhuthugal organization was very helpful and thanked the CSG members in the village and the Director for helping the vulnerable people in society.



SCHOOL ENROLLMENT CAMPAIGN

School Enrollment campaign was conducted in the villages of Avinashi and Palladam Taluk of Tiruppur District. In the campaign, children, parents of vulnerable communities and Vizhuhuthugal volunteers participated in the campaign and created awareness among the village people. During this lockdown, children were compelled to stay at the home without studying and this leads to the loss of interest in studies and many have dropped out of their schools in the recent past. Vizhthugal have started enrolling the children in the regular schools according to their standard through volunteers

In Vizhuthugal work with women, we have seen that the power of group works the best. The Self Help Group (SHG) format was the best way to bring together the social capital of women in rural areas. The first step in our SHG format is to mobilise women and create awareness of the need for empowerment. Once the group has been established, we train them to utilise their savings and skills to create enterprises for income generation. Our model goes beyond just creating groups, we help the women enterprises with market linkages, business development and credit support too.

Vizhuthugal has formed 52 new Self Help Groups in Nambiyur taluk of Erode district and Avinashi Taluk of Tiruppur District. Totally 732 members enrolled in these 52 SHG's. These SHGs help the women to relieve from poverty and empower them to self sustain. Vizhuthugal has helped these SHGs to get loans from the Bank to start up an enterprise which can be paid in small instalments and minimum per cent of interest. Our SHG members have received nearly 3 Crore rupees from Bank as a loan for starting up medium-size enterprises.

MED SUPPORT TO SHG WOMEN AND CSG MEMBER

Vizhuthugal has supported 80 members for Micro Enterprise Development in Nambiyur Taluk, Erode District. MED is very useful for people to start Medium size enterprises like Grocery stores, Vegetable selling, Small size Tiffen shops etc. Many women have benefitted through this MED and started contributing to their families.



Community support groups in the target villages and Vizhuthugal Field coordinators and Volunteers have utilized the lockdown very effectively and were able to meet most of the individuals directly and identified their needs and submitted petitions to the respective government officials to fulfil the needs of the community.

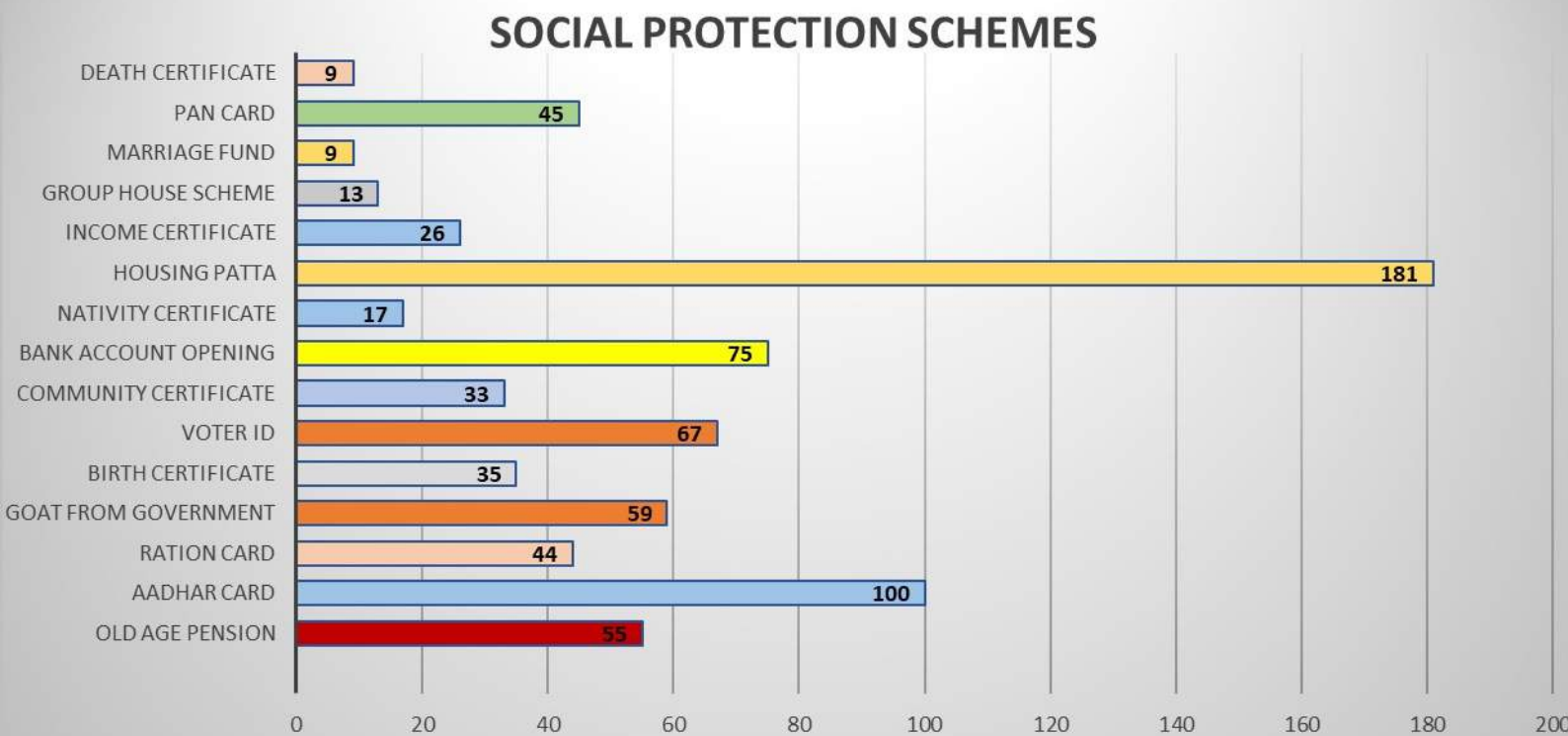
MICRO ENTERPRISE SUPPORT TO SHG WOMEN



Mrs Vijaya aged 38 years is a resident of the Palanigoundanpalayam area in Nambiyur taluk, Erode District. Her husband is agricultural labour and gets work seasonally and she has two children who are studying in a government school. Vizhuthugal organization is functioning in this area for the past 5 years and has formed many Community Support Groups in their target villages to support the village people.

Mrs Vijaya is an active member of the CSG group and a member of the SHG functioning in her village. She participated in all the SHG meetings and CSG group meetings conducted by the organization once in 15 days. During the covid-19 pandemic, as most of the people have lost their livelihood, Mrs Vijaya also suffered a lot by losing her livelihood. She asked for help in the SHG meeting by explaining her current situation. Vizhuthugal bought a goat for Vijaya because she does not know any work other than agriculture. she has grazed the goat and increased the goat numbers. Now she is happily leading her life and has become an entrepreneur. She expressed her heartfelt thanks to the Vizhuthugal organisation for the support.

LINKAGES WITH SOCIAL PROTECTION SCHEMES



Community Support Group Members and Adolescent Support group members in the villages helped the community people in linking with the government social security schemes like Old Age Pension, Aadhar Card, Ration Card, Birth Certificate, Voter ID, Community Certificate, Nativity Certificate, Death Certificate, PAN Card, Income Certificate and also linked with PMSBY.

LIFE SKILL TRAINING TO ADOLESCENT GIRLS

With the help of the Integrated Child Development Schemes (ICDS) department in Tiruppur district, Vizhuthugal have given training to young adolescent girls on Life Skill training. During the training awareness on Health, Education, Children and Women Safety, Menstrual Hygiene and the importance of intake of nutritious food were given to the young adolescent girls and the women in the villages. 175 adolescent girls and women participated in the training program and benefited through this program.



CSG MEMBERS HELPED IN RECONSTRUCTING THE ROAD

Kuppipalayam, a village in Emmampoondi Panchayat, Nambiyur Block, Erode district has a population of nearly 210 families. This village was connected by a road to Nambiyur and Gobichettipalayam. The road which connects the village was damaged and people afraid to use the bridge in seeing the condition.

During the rainy season, this road got worsen and create more damage. People afraid to drive 2 wheelers on this bridge. Since this route connects the main route to Kolapalur and Erode, heavy vehicles used this route for their easy transportation which makes this road more damaging.

On seeing this condition, people in the village decided to complain about this to the Village Administrative Officer and approached CSG members to take forward this issue to government officials. On the request received from the community people, the resolution was passed in the group meeting and submitted a request letter to VAO for renovating the laying road to the village which connects Nambiyur and Gobichettipalayam.

This issue was taken to the district administration and funds were sanctioned for renovating the road. After the release of the fund, they demolished the old road and started constructing the new one by arranging the alternate way for the transport. The construction work last for 3 months and got completed and opened for public usage. Similarly CSG member have initiated the government to construct a bridge in Semmampalayam village.



People in the village were very happy about seeing the new bridge and thanked from the bottom of their heart to CSG members and Vizhuthugal members for taking this issue and completing this task.

CAPACITY BUILDING TRAINING TO WOMEN SELF HELP GROUP

Capacity Building training was organized for the Women Self Help Group leaders by the Vizhuthugal Organization. Members of the District Child Protection Unit, Block Development Officers, and Vizhuthugal staff members participated in the training along with the 155 Self-help group members and Community support group members



ADOLESCENT GIRLS LIFE SKILL TRAINING

Internal Complain Committee was formed in the spinning mill of Erode District, ICC committee consists of 15 members of representation from the Mill and NGO. After the formation of the committee, Life Skill education training was conducted in the mill and 37 adolescent girls and women participated in the training



WORKERS SUPPORT GROUP

Vizhuthugal has formed 7 Workers Support Group in the villages which are outside the mills and 105 workers were joined in this support group. Training on Safety, Security in the workplace, Welfare schemes for workers, Menstrual hygiene, and the laws available for the workers were conducted and 244 workers participated in the training programs and benefited



COMMUNITY SUPPORT GROUP

Community Support groups play a vital role in the villages. These groups act as a bridge between the Vizhuthugal organization and the community people in fulfilling their basic needs. CSG's helped the people in connecting with the various social security schemes and ensure they receive benefits from them. During the Covid-19 lockdown, these group members were involved in helping the Anganwadi workers and Mid-day meal in charge to distribute the food items like rice, vegetable, and egg to the school going and Anganwadi enrolled children in the village directly in their home, Community Support group members are vigilant in preventing child marriages from occurring in the villages and to eliminate child labour in the villages and members came forward by themselves in identifying the needy and helped the organization in providing Food materials to the Vulnerable, downtrodden, destitute women, aged persons, persons with disabilities, and economically weaker people.



FREE LAND PATTAS TO 150 LANDLESS COMMUNITY PEOPLE

414 families are living in Ranganathapuram Village, Nambiyur Block, Erode District, and the Vizhuthugal organization is working in these villages for the past five years. Since this village comes under Town Panchayat, benefits other villages receive from the Village Panchayat do not apply to this village and are backward in many ways. Wastes from different parts of the Nambiyur block were dumped in Ranganathapuram village and that affects the people's health very badly. Community Support Group in the village fought continuously with the Nambiyur Municipal Office by giving petitions and on the continuous pressure created municipality removed the wastes from the village. This is one example of how these village people are fighting for their rights and getting benefits from the government. Vizhuthugal organization works in the villages for the Education, Sanitation and Adolescent girls, Children developments.

Each village has Adolescent Girls Group, Adolescent Boys Group, Community Support Group, Children Resource Centre, Children Parliament, and Women Self Help Group were formed and actively functioned. Awareness of Education and Sanitation were given to Adolescent Girls and Boys in the village to continue their education and to stop dropouts from the schools.



Awareness programs were conducted in the village to eradicate the child marriage system and abolish child labour. Awareness of the importance of savings was given to Self Help Group members to stop borrowing money from Financiers. Community support groups in the village focus on fulfilling the need of the village by writing petitions to the government officials. In all the Community support group meetings, it is requested that land pattas is needed for 150 families in the village and many petitions were given to the government officials to get free pattas for the landless people.

On the continuous struggle and pressure created by the government officials in the district, an announcement was released by the government that people who are landless and living in Ranganathapuram village can apply for the free land pattas in the area that is one kilometre away from the village. Based on this notification, people in the village applied for free pattas, and 150 family's names were allotted in November 2019 with the condition of families should live in the place they are allotted but even after 6 months, pattas were not distributed. When Mr K A Sengottaiyan, Education Minister visited Nambiyur for a program and all the members of the village along with Community Support Group members went to the program and submitted petitions to the Education Minister to issue free pattas to the name already allotted. Based on the petition received, 150 free pattas were distributed to the landless people in November 2020. People who have received the free pattas thanked the Community Support Group members and the organization for helping them in getting land in their name and requested the community support group members to help them in getting the necessities like drinking water connection, electricity, and the road to the people.

AWARENESS PROGRAM ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT AT WORKPLACE

Vizhuthugal organized an Awareness Session on Sexual Harassment at Workplace in Textile Unit. The talk aimed at creating awareness among the employees regarding various types of sexual harassment, how to make complaints and laws related to the same. The sessions were conducted by Ms K Chandra, a Psychologist who works with Vizhuthugal—an organization that believes that sexual harassment at the workplace does not only cause mental and/or physical damage to the person harassed; but also seriously curtails opportunities at work by creating a discriminatory work environment.

She explained to the participant's various aspects related to hearing and addressing complaints regarding sexual harassment and spreading awareness about gender-related issues and functioning of the Internal Complaints Committee. Discussion about various laws in context to sexual harassment namely, Indian Penal Code, Criminal Procedures Code and Information Technology Act also took place. The session concluded with details of how any organization can take preventive measures against sexual harassment.



AWARENESS PROGRAM ON POVERTY ERADICATION

On the event of International Day for the Eradication of Poverty, an awareness program on Poverty eradication was conducted in Perumanallur, Avinashi and other villages of Tiruppur District. Women and Children in these villages participated in the awareness campaign and raised slogans like "***Lets Eradicate Poverty***" and "***Let's Create Poverty-Free Village***"



HEALTH



Education is to the mind what health is to the body. When we started working with children, 15 years ago, we realised education without good health is only going to hinder our progress. The chances of a sick or unhealthy child coming to school are remote. For a family to stay healthy, access to healthcare, awareness of food, nutrition and hygiene is very important. The lack of health care facilities and awareness in rural India, drove us to set up our health intervention in 2004. Access to health care is the broader goal of our health intervention. We try to bridge the gaps in the existing health care network, through preventive and curative health initiatives. Our initiatives are four-pronged; access through medical camps, sanitation and hygiene management, maternal and child health, and infrastructure upgrades.

AWARENESS PROGRAM ON HEALTH NUTRITION AND SAFETY OF ADOLESCENTS

Awareness on Health and Nutrition for Adolescent girls, Anti-Natal Care and Post Natal Care mothers were organized by Anganwadi Centre in-charges in Cheyur, Muthuchettipalayam, Aathiyur, and Karuvaloor village Anganwadi's. The awareness program was headed by Dr Mohan raj, Mrs Saraswathi -CDPO, Mrs Banu-Nutritionist, Mrs Thangamani-Supervisor ICDS, Mrs Chandra-Program Manage-Vizhuthugal, Mrs Saradha-Vizhuthugal, and Anganwadi teachers and helpers. There are 187 children, adolescent girls, mothers were benefited from this awareness program. The main objective of the program was to bring awareness to the children, adolescent girls, Anti-natal care, and Post Natal care women in the village. Dr Mohan raj spoke about the health issues that affect the person in not taking the nutritious food and also about the hormonal changes that happen during the transition and Mrs Banu listed out few food items that are easily available for the children, adolescents girls to be healthy. Anganwadi teachers prepared nutritious food items and given them to the children, adolescent girls, and mothers.



Mrs Saraswathi appreciated the Anganwadi teachers and helpers in preparing the nutritious food for the children and also spoke about the importance of intaking the nutritious food and availing school education up to 18 years and Mrs Chandra and Mrs Saradha gave an introduction about Vizhuthugal organization and also spoke about the child and adolescent safety in the society and how to lead a happy life by giving an example through a moral story to the children and adolescents.



HEALTH AWARENESS CAMP

A Health awareness camp was organized for manual scavengers and sanitary workers by the Vizhuthugal organization at Avinashi Town panchayat office, Tiruppur district. A total of 671 individuals participated and benefited from this program. Awareness was created on wearing a face mask, using sanitiser, hand washing and vaccination to sanitary workers.

This awareness program was inaugurated by Mr M.Thangavel, Director - Vizhuthugal and headed by Mrs K.Chandra, Program coordinator-Vizhuthugal organisation. Sanitiser and face masks were distributed to the sanitary workers who attended this program. Mr Gunasekaran-EO- Avinashi Town Panchayat, Mr Sokkanathan-Sanitary Inspector, Mr Govindaraj-Health Inspector, Dr Chandran - Avinashi Medical Officer, Dr Yogachandran - Siddha doctor, Mr Balan - Supervisor and hospital nurses participated in the program. The medical team monitored the height, weight, Blood pressure, temperature, pulse rate, SPo2, RTPCR test for sanitary workers. The doctor gave medical consultations to the sanitary workers. Most of the sanitary workers suffered from hand pain, leg pain, body pain and headache.



In this program, most of the women sanitary workers have participated and they also asked consultation for their family members with doctor. Vizhuthugal distributed personal protective equipment like face masks, gloves, boots and caps to the sanitary workers in the program. All the sanitary workers expressed their heartfelt thanks to the Vizhuthugal organisation and also said they will give constant support to the organisation.

PSYCHOLOGICAL CARE AND MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING FOR WORKERS AND VICTIMS



Migrant workers families living in Tiruppur District and Erode District were mostly engaged in the textile and garment industries. Most of these workers reached Tiruppur and Erode districts through brokers and placed in garment and textiles work. During the COVID-19 they were left clueless without any relief and moral support. Workers somehow contacted Vizhuthugal and explained their situation and the coordinator visited the place where they were staying and understood their conditions. Counselling sessions were arranged for the migrants and most of them participated in the counselling sessions. Most of these migrant workers who live in these districts are mostly from Assam, West Bengal, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, and Odisha.

Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust has identified these migrant workers who were in distress and supported them by organizing Mental Health Training. Migrant Workers were the most affected in the country during the Covid-19 spread and its lockdown. Migrant workers were weeks from running out of food, struggled to access healthcare and faced acute livelihood problems during the partial lockdowns imposed by states to limit the second surge of the Covid-19 pandemic. Psychological Care and Mental Health programs were conducted for these migrant workers.



These migrant workers have stayed in the district during the second wave of covid-19 and its lockdown avoid going back to their native places like Odisha, Assam, West Bengal, Jharkhand, Tripura, Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and Madhya Pradesh.

MEDICAL CAMP

The medical camp was organised for manual scavengers and sanitary workers by The Vizhuthugal organisation at Government boys higher secondary school, Nambiyur taluk in Erode district. In this program, 105 sanitary workers were participated and benefited. Awareness was given on wearing masks, how to use sanitiser, hand washing and vaccination to sanitary workers.

Sanitary workers from 20 villages and 15 panchayats were attended this program.

Before the Medical consultation, staff nurses monitor the height, weight, Blood pressure, temperature, pulse rate, SPO2, RTPCR test for sanitary workers. The doctor gave medical consultations to them. Most of the sanitary workers suffered from leg pain, body pain and headache.



In this program, most of the women sanitary workers were participated and they also asked consultation for their family members with doctor. Sanitation workers demands for salary increase and uniform change in the meeting to vizhuthugal organisation.

All the sanitary workers expressed their heart felt thanks to Mr.Thangavel, Director of Vizhuthugal organisation and also said they will give constant support for the organisation.

ELIMINATION OF BONDED LABOUR



Bonded labor stems from a variety of causes, which are highly debated in the literature: an ingrained legacy of caste-based discrimination, vast poverty and inequality, and inadequate education system, unjust social relations, and the government's unwillingness to alter the status quo all exemplify a few such causes. Additionally, India's caste system has made it difficult to delineate the history of labourers' debt bondage and child labour today. There are many cultural reasons for the persistence of child labour in India. An expectation that children should contribute to the socio-economic survival of the family and community, as well as the existence of large families, land scarcity, and inadequate enforcement of labour laws are contributing factors to this problem. In urban areas, following the migration of families to overpopulated cities, the disintegration of such families due to alcoholism and unemployment often results in a proliferation of children living on the street, becoming labourers, and entering into other non-social activities. For the past 28 years, Vizhuthugal organization have been rescued people who were worked under bondage with the support of the United Nations and International Justice Mission organizations. So far Vizhuthugal have liberated **8741** persons from slavery and **237** persons have been liberated from slavery during 2020-2021

AWARENESS OF WOMEN AND CHILD PROTECTION IN MODERN SLAVERY

Awareness campaign on Women and Child Protection, Human Trafficking and Slavery is being conducted in Kadampur village and Sathyamangalam in collaboration with the District Social Welfare Department-Government of Tamil Nadu, Integrated Child Protection Scheme, District Child Protection Unit, District Legal Services Authority. Violence against women and children is a serious public health concern, with costs at multiple levels of society. Although violence is a threat to everyone, women and children are particularly susceptible to victimization because they often have fewer rights or lack appropriate means of protection. Mr P. Eswaramurthi Subordinate Judge, Sub Court Sathyamangalam, Mr Subbaiah-Deputy Superintendent of Police, Dr Ashok Chairman-Child Welfare Committee, Mr David Raja District Child Protection Officer-Erode, Mr M. Thangavel, Director- Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust, Inspector of All Women Police Station, Panchayat leaders and 61 other women and children participated in the awareness program. Awareness street play on Children and Women protection and safety was played by Volunteers to sensitize the community people.



LABOUR RESCUED FROM BONDED SYSTEM IN PALLADAM

Karuppusamy (27) and Manju (22) along with their 3 children named Sundarapandi (7), Abi (6) & Lega (3) belongs to the Dalit community from the Usilampatti area of Madurai District were staying and working in a poultry farm in K.Ayyampalayam Village, Palladam Block, Tiruppur District due to poverty.

The owner of the poultry farm fixed a salary of Rs. 300/- for male workers and Rs. 200/- for female workers. The family worked in the poultry farm regardless of time and requested the owner of the poultry farm to increase their wages since the wage is not sufficient for them to take care of their 3 children.

But the owner harassed them with unparliamentary words and told them that he won't increase the wages for them. Also said that they had to drink the water which is mixed with Chicken Feed. The family reached the Vizhuthugal organization and explained their difficult situation over the phone. Immediately on hearing the news, Vizhuthugal coordinators V.Govindaraj and T. Sarankumar started searching the victims in the poultry farm on 31.10.2020.

Volunteers from Vizhuthugal were able to search 30 Poultry farms on that day and enquired about the family since the mobile number of the affected family was switched off. Around 5.30 pm they reached our coordinator and informed them that they came out of the poultry farm and staying at the K Ayyampalayam bus stop. Volunteers reached the bus stop and enquired about their situation. The family members explained the abuse they had undergone at the Poultry Farm to them. Food was arranged for the affected and planned to arrange a short stay in Mariyalaya Home and take further Legal action. The affected family was not willing to stay in the home and also not interested to go to their native village and requested Vizhuthugal coordinators to arrange a better job for them in



any other good local Poultry farm since the wife of the affected was pregnant and also, they have registered in a local Primary Health Centre for periodic check-ups. Now they are working in a Poultry Farm in Puliayampatti village.

INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ABOLITION OF SLAVERY



International Day for the Abolition of Slavery was observed every year on 2nd December by United Nations throughout the world. According to the International Labour Organisation (ILO), more than 40 million people worldwide are victims of modern slavery. Although modern slavery is not defined in law, it is used as an umbrella term covering practices such as forced labour, debt bondage, forced marriage, and human trafficking. Essentially, it refers to situations of exploitation that a person cannot refuse or leave because of threats, violence, coercion, deception, and/or abuse of power. The focus of this day is on eradicating contemporary forms of slavery, such as trafficking in persons, sexual exploitation, the worst forms of child labor, forced marriage, and the forced recruitment of children for use in armed conflict.

Vizhuthugal has organized an awareness program for the victims and the migrant workers living in 20 villages of Avinashi Block, Tiruppur District. The program was inaugurated by Mrs. K Chandra, Program Manager Vizhuthugal and spoke about the forms of Modern Slavery and how they are exploited without their knowledge. People end up trapped in modern slavery because they are vulnerable to being tricked, trapped, and exploited, often as a result of poverty and exclusion. It is these external circumstances that push people into taking risky decisions in search of opportunities to provide for their families, or are simply pushed into jobs in exploitative conditions. Mr. V Govindaraj, Legal Coordinator Vizhuthugal spoke on his experience by addressing slavery and rescuing the victims of trafficking and the local community to prevent young girls and boys from entering into high-risk and slavery-like works. He pointed out the incident that took place last year in the Mettupalayam area where 17 were killed because of the untouchability wall. If we wanted to bring an end to Slavery, we must work together to eliminate caste-based discrimination in society. He added that in the recent past, slaves are not bought by others but are created by fellow humans in names providing an advance to the work they accepted to do. When people are engaged on a contract basis, they are considered slavery. As an end note, he added that everyone has to work together to the abolition of slavery.

3 ADOLESCENT GIRLS RESCUED FROM PVT MILL

Vizhuthugal and officials from various government departments rescued three adolescent girls from a private spinning mill near Palladam in Tirupur District. This rescue was happened based on the petition submitted by Vizhuthugal to District Collector and officials from Revenue Department, District Child Protection Unit, Department of Social Welfare, Directorate of Industrial Safety and Health and the District Police visited the mill and rescued the children. The three rescued were from Tirupattur district and were allegedly forced to work despite their request of going back to their places. Out of the rescued two were 20 years old and one is 15 years old. Two adults were handed over to their respective family and the other one was handed over to Child Welfare Committee and later handed over to their family.



INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS DAY

On the eve of International Human Rights Day on December 10, we organized a seminar via the Internet of Vizhuthugal organization. Debates and awareness programs around the world on the need to protect human rights in today's context continue to this day. But it is true that human rights are not yet available. The social coordinator of the Vizhuthugal Organization, Mr Saran Kumar welcomed the audience. The first phase of the program was graced by the special invitee, Honourable Dr.S.Markandan Iya, former Vice-Chancellor, Gandhi Gram University. In his speech, he explained what human rights are and what types of human rights are, and how essential human rights are.



REHABILITATION OF MIGRANT WORKERS



In recent decades, globalization and urbanisation have led to an increase in migration, with people moving in search of work, to flee from conflict or persecution, to escape natural disasters or the adverse effects of climate change.

The recent migrant crisis triggered by the Covid-19 lockdown, grabbed headlines worldwide creating a wave of sympathy. This India-wide exodus of beaten-down humans walking on highways bereft of public transport and their silent suffering is now etched in our collective consciousness. It brought the plight of migrant workers to the forefront and exposed major issues such as the lack of social security.

When workers migrate to a new place, they have to adapt to an unfamiliar language, culture and different social protocols which may cause social isolation. Another major issue impoverished migrants face is proving their identity in the new place which could take years. This results in a loss of access to social schemes and subsidies for food, fuel, health services, or education that are reserved for the economically vulnerable.

INTERNATIONAL MIGRANTS DAY

Migration has been a brave expression of the individual's will to overcome difficulty and to live a better life. The act of moving from one region to another is central to human nature. Today this act is still very prevalent because it has created challenges and opportunities for societies throughout the world. Each year, International Migrants Day observed around a specific theme. The International Migrants Day 2020 theme is Reimagining Human Mobility. International Migrants Day was celebrated in Kanakkampalayam village of Tiruppur District where nearly 75 families from different parts of the state stay with their family members which include 157 individuals and 45 Children.



Vizhuthugal Legal coordinator spoke about the difficulties faced by the inter-state migrant workers and their family members. Especially, the women workers who have traveled more than 3000 Kms have faced a lot of issues like physical, Psychological, and Societal acceptance. In the meeting, Social Security Schemes that are available for the migrant workers were also shared and the procedure to receive benefits under the scheme. 30 migrant workers participated in the program and know about the importance of the day and the need for the celebration.

MEDICAL CAMP TO THE MIGRANT WORKERS AND COMMUNITY PEOPLE

The aim of the health camp was to administer Health Assessment, spread Health Awareness and provide Health Counselling. A medical health care camp had been set up in TMC Colony and Ambedkar Nagar, Tiruppur District on December 2020. In the camp, proper medical treatment of the people of TMC Colony, Ambedkar Nagar, and the nearby area was done and remedial measures were provided, all free of cost, including the basic medicines required for an early recovery. A total of 210 patients were examined. Among them 109 were male and 101 were female.



The numbers of children were 52 and adults 158. Patients came from 20 different villages. A blood pressure (BP) check was performed on every patient. After that, they were sent to their respective doctors where they were appropriate given the right directions regarding their health. The doctor carefully listened to the problems the patients were facing and provided an appropriate solution to curb them. The majority of the people were suffering from chronic back pain, Cold and high/low B.P.

LEGAL AWARENESS TRAINING FOR VICTIMS AND MIGRANT WORKERS



A legal awareness program for Migrant workers was conducted on 08.11.2020 in Thekkalur village, Avinashi. 20 migrant workers, parents, and children were benefited from this program, and also Panchayat president and other local body members participated in the program. Mr M Thangavel, Vizhuthugal Director and Mr V Govindaraj, Legal coordinator of the organization participated in the program and explained the laws available for the migrant workers and their family members in the country. They also spoke about various Legal, Social, Psychological, social security schemes available for them and Vizhuthugal will help them in receiving the benefits from it. Also added migrant workers can reach Vizhuthugal for any help in the future. Panchayat president spoke about the various help extended by Vizhuthugal during the pandemic days and thanked the Director for helping them at the right time with the food items

CAPACITY BUILDING TRAINING FOR THE VICTIMS AND INTER STATE MIGRANT WORKERS



MEETING WITH MIGRANT WORKERS AFFECTED BY SLAVERY

The intellectual team was taken to a village where victims and migrant workers live as a family and as individuals for exposure. Most of these victims and migrant workers are working in the Textile and Garment units in Tiruppur District. Vizhuthugal has supported these people with emergency relief kits during the pandemic. Most of these migrant workers from Odisha, Assam, West Bengal, Bihar, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Tripura, Utter Pradesh, and Madhya Pradesh, and also the vulnerable communities from the other districts of Tamil Nadu who are more prone to slavery. Victims who were trafficked and rescued and rehabilitated shared their experiences with the team. Haribathar, 18 years old completed his 12th and working in a garment unit expressed that he had travelled from Odisha along with other people through road to work in the textile and garment units in Tiruppur district. We were brought to Tiruppur by the agent giving a lot of false statements that the place we stay and the food will be too good and will get a decent salary. But only after reaching the place, we found out that all were not true and we are locked. We worked in the company for 10 to 12 hours and there is only a minimum amount of time we get for taking a rest. We felt very bad after reaching Tiruppur by leaving our home and family members until the help was received. After coming out of that place, special counseling was given to us and I was felt much happy when we receive the counselling in the Hindi language.



Next Mrs Karuthammal and Mrs Lakshmiammal shared the experience they have encountered due to caste discrimination and slavery and the activities they have done in these years. Both spoke about how these people are vulnerable to all types of slavery and exploitation. Both the forced and bonded labour system happened to these vulnerable community people which they cannot resist. Weak economic positions and lack of access to resources increase Dalits' dependence on wage labour. Extreme poverty forces Dalits to take up loans and they hold no other assets to level their debt other than their labour. When Dalits try to fight for their rights or resist abuse and exploitation, they face extreme violent and sometimes brutal resistance by the higher caste landowners. The contractor used to carry a stick, with which he would frighten us. We were forced to work continuously for 12-14 hours and were not even allowed to take lunch breaks. We starved and fell ill," says Lakshmiammal. We struggled a lot to help our children grow up healthier. With a lot of struggle and with the help of good minded people, we were rescued and rehabilitated and send to our native place and our children are supported with education and are in a good position. Now we are working for the welfare of the vulnerable Dalit community people in our location and create a lot of awareness to these people on the bad side of slavery and demand for rights.

HONORED ANTI CHILD TRAFFICKING UNIT FOR RESCUING 58 CHILDREN IN TIRUPPUR DISTRICT



58 missing children including 42 forced into Child labour have been rescued and rehabilitated in Tiruppur district from July 2020 to December 2020. Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust provided sufficient information and assistance to the Anti Child Trafficking Unit in identifying and rehabilitating the missing children. Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust honoured the Anti Child Trafficking Unit- Police Inspector Mrs Badrunnisa Begum for her involvement in the operation. Director M. Thangavel Legal Coordinator V.Govindaraj, Social Coordinator Sarankumar, K.Chandra, and N. Saradha were present during the meeting

RELIEF MATERIAL DISTRIBUTION



Vizhuthugal Social Education and Development Trust works towards women textile and garment workers for more than 20 years in Tiruppur, Erode and Coimbatore Districts. With the fierce onslaught of COVID-19 in the first and second wave and the resulting lockdown, the Tiruppur manufacturing unit where he worked shut down. The industries recovered from the jolt of the first wave of coronavirus when over one lakh migrant workers from both Coimbatore and Tiruppur industries rushed back to their home towns in Bihar, Uttar Pradesh and Odisha by special trains. With the spread of COVID-19 sweeping across various parts of Tamil Nadu, some of the industrialists in the State are apprehensive of migrant workers leaving for their hometowns considering the health conditions.

After the lockdown, local administrations have identified that nearly 1.3 lakh migrant workers were stranded in the city, in which 68,000 migrants were living the hostels provided by their respective companies and the rest of 62,000 migrants were staying outside their workplace. Out of these 62,000 migrants, 30,000 migrants are not even on the payroll of any companies. Since they are working in job order companies they do not permanently work in one place. The district administration seeks out help from local NGO's to meet out the needs of these left out migrants and reached VIZHUTHUGAL by sharing the location and details of the migrants who are suffering without food for days.

While thousands of migrant labourers in Tiruppur remain clueless about returning to their native villages in Odisha, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal and Rajasthan amid confusing signals from the government, industries in the district are also anxious about the possibility of huge labor scarcity. Recently, the Central government announced that for the benefit of stranded migrant workers, States would be allocated 5 kg of rice per person and 1 kg of "Chana dal" per family, all free of cost, during May and June in the light of the COVID-19 pandemic.
